In the learning spaces, ākonga will look at the difference between equality and equity. They will recognise that we are all individuals and that some of us require additional support for our learning and behaviour.




This term, by the end of this week, you will receive an up to date report for your child in regard to their Character and Relationship Kete. These reports are posted on Seesaw.



This week is Te Wiki o Te Reo Māori. It is a time to celebrate the unique Māori language and culture of Aotearora. At Southbrook some of the ways we do this is by:

- Integrating Māori tikanga into our daily routines and programmes eg- waiata, karakia and whakatauki.
- Explicitly teaching Te Reo Māori as well as integrating it into everyday language within our Learning Spaces.
- Knowing our students and building on their pepeha throughout our kura with whānau.
- Valuing and using tuakana-teina with Buddy Classes,
 School Houses and student leadership across our kura.
- Using both the Aotearoa NZ Histories and Local Curriculum to guide our planning and teaching.
- Teaching about our local history, including creation stroies from Ngaī Tūahuriri manawhenua, as well as important Māori events such as Te Tiriti o Waitangi and Matariki.
- Having the whole school participate in Kapa Haka weekly and out Kapa Haka ropū represtening our kura at the local festival.
- Building staff knowledge by working within our Puketeraki Community of Learning, participating in the Tūahuriru Marae workshop and also studying with Te Ahu o te Reo Māori.
- Teaching Te Whare Tapa Whā as a part of our PB4L and Circle Time programmes.

The Southbrook School Board of Trustees met on Wednesday the 11th of September 2024 for the second meeting of the term.

The Board heard that it has been a challenging term due to the amount of children and staff affected by winter illnesses, but Acting Principal Wendy Lindsay pointed out that in spite of this there had also been many positive things happening across the term and she expressed great pride in both students and staff for all their hard work. Wendy's term as Acting Principal, and Holly Marsh as Deputy Principal, is coming to a close at the end of this term with the return of Principal Julie Walls following her sabbatical. The Board thanked both Wendy and Holly for their efforts and success in ensuring that Southbrook School continued to run smoothly during Julie's time away.

With the end of term approaching, so is Southbrook School's 150th Jubilee. The team behind organising the festivities have worked hard on putting together a great program, and the Board noted that it is not too late to register and would like to encourage anyone with connection to the school, including current students, to sign up and come along to celebrate.

Another topic that was discussed, which will bring joy to a number of Southbrook School's families across the summer, was the opening of the school pool, which is set to occur early in term 4. The Board were asked to reflect on the cost of having access to the pool for the summer season and the factors that influence how much a pool key should cost, such as increased costs in electricity due to heating. In spite of this, the Board felt that the pool keys needed to be reasonably priced and agreed to a small increase from last year's fee.

Finally, parent representative Stacey Moore and Wendy Lindsay attended last week's PTA meeting and they were pleased to report that a couple of Southbrook School's new families had attended and expressed interest in joining the PTA. The Board encourages anyone who might be curious about helping out with PTA tasks to go to their next meeting, as many hands make light work.


